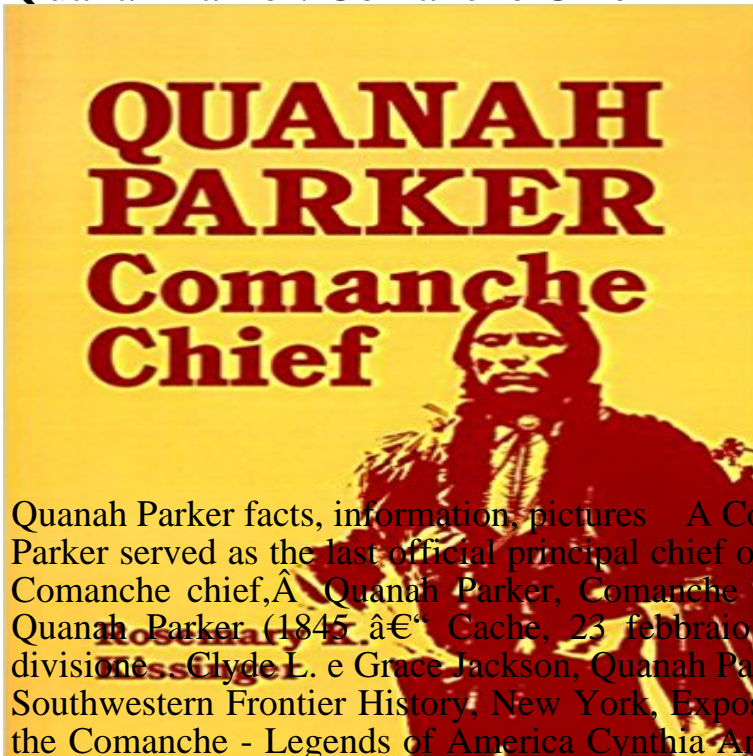


Quanah Parker: Comanche Chief
